Eligibility	The recruitment of Modern Apprentices is a fair, open and merit based process (16+) and with permanence from the start of the apprenticeship. Previous Modern Apprentices in the Scottish Government are not eligible to apply.
Qualification	Throughout the first 12 months the successful candidate will be expected to gain a relevant SVQ qualification in Business Administration. Support will be provided by a qualified assessor who will work with the candidate on a monthly basis. Time will be given to work on your qualification, this includes delivering 2 presentations.
Nationality Requirements	<p>PART 1 - with effect from 1 January 2021 the civil service nationality rules, that apply throughout the UK, are amended to reflect the UK's exit from the European Union. It remains the case that you will be eligible to apply for any job in the Scottish Government if you are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - a UK national or have dual nationality with one part being British; - a national of the Republic of Ireland; or - a national of a Commonwealth country. <p>- not a UK, Commonwealth or Irish nationals, but are a newly arrived overseas national who is to be employed within the Civil Service as an Official Veterinarian.</p> <p>PART 2 - In addition, you will be eligible to apply for a Scottish Government job if you are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - a national of any of the member states of the European Economic Area (EEA) or Switzerland and certain Turkish nationals who were working in the UK Civil Service on or before 31st December 2020; - a national of any of the member states of the EEA or Switzerland and certain Turkish Nationals who have built up the right to work in the Civil Service on or before 31st December 2020 and have leave to remain in the UK either through the EU Settlement Scheme or limited or indefinite leave to remain; or - a certain category of family member of a relevant national of any of the member states of the EEA or Switzerland or certain Turkish nationals. <p>Further information about civil service nationality rules is available here.</p>

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Information about the Business Area

Marine Scotland was created in April 2009 when the Scottish Fisheries Protection Agency (SFPA) and Fisheries Research Services (FRS), were merged with the Marine Directorate within the Scottish Government.

The SFPA became Marine Scotland Compliance and the FRS became Marine Scotland Science.

Marine Scotland Compliance is responsible for deterring and detecting illegal activities through effective compliance and enforcement arrangements. We employ Marine staff that are responsible for the crewing of Marine Scotland Compliance's three Marine Protection vessels and Coastal Inspection staff. Who make up the Sea Fisheries Inspectorate. The coastal staff are located at 18 Fishery Offices around the Scottish coast, and at the Registration of Buyers and Sellers Unit which is based in Aberdeen.

Information about the Role

The Assistant Fishery Officer is the first point of contact for the public and other government departments, stakeholders. As such, they must have knowledge of Marine Scotland's Aims and Objectives and have the knowledge and ability to be able to put the caller in touch with the correct person. This vacancy offers an opportunity to join a small team and provide admin support to the fishery officers with the prospect of being able to advance to the role of fishery officer through dedicated on the job training, as such the Assistant Fishery Officer will also be required to assist the Senior Fishery Officer/Fishery Officer with inspection duties both on the pier and on board fishing vessels and accompany Warranted Officers in other inspection tasks including visits to premises and landing creeks.

Specific Duties

- Dealing with internal and external enquiries.
- Updating and maintaining paper and electronic files.
- Data input and analysis on IT systems.
- Collating materials.
- Organising and issuing letters and papers to Industry.
- Assisting and recording of inspection duties.

Essential Criteria

2. The ability to work with limited supervision.

- Result – What was the result?
- Reflection – Do you have reflections on the event? How have you applied this learning since? What would you do differently next time?

Political Activity

All appointees to the Civil Service must be able to fully comply with the requirements of the [Civil Service Code](#) and are expected to carry out their role with dedication and a commitment to the Civil Service and its core values: which are Honesty, Integrity, Objectivity and Impartiality. As part of this, some restrictions are placed on political activity. You will see that there is a question regarding such activity on the application form. A positive response to this question should not affect the consideration of your application, but is likely to mean that you will be asked additional questions at interview. What you then say at interview will clarify if you meet the requirements of the Civil Service Code.

The Civil Service Code states that:

You must

Serve the government, whatever its political persuasion, to the best of your ability in a way which maintains political impartiality and is in line with the requirements of this code, no matter what your own political beliefs are

Act in a way which deserves and retains the confidence of ministers, while at the same time ensuring that you will be able to establish the same relationship with those whom you may be required to serve in some future government

Comply with any restrictions that have been laid down on your political activities

You must not

Act in a way that is determined by party political considerations, or use official resources for party political purposes

Allow your personal political views to determine any advice you give or your actions.

Pre-Employment Security and Eligibility Checks

If you are successful, and are not currently a serving member of the Civil Service, we will as part of the Scottish Governments pre-employment process carry out the following enquiries into your identity, employment/academic history, nationality and immigration status, 'unspent' criminal record (Disclosure certificate), health and other matters, to ensure that you are qualified for the appointment.

Completion of Pre-Employment Security and Eligibility Checks

When the pre-employment enquiries are satisfactorily completed to our standard, we will then make you a formal offer of appointment and you will be expected to take up appointment as soon as possible. If you have any question about our pre-employment checks please do not hesitate to get in touch.

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Selection

We have a two stage selection process. The first stage is where we review your application form to decide if it does or does not meet the Essential Criteria. Those who meet the Essential Criteria will normally be selected for the next stage of assessment. It is therefore important that you complete your application as fully, but concisely, as possible to demonstrate how you meet the criteria for the post. Please ensure that you study the selection criteria carefully before you complete your application.

The next stage of assessment will be a competency based interview and in most circumstances this will be accompanied by other forms of assessment such as a presentation or written test. You will be given further details about the competency based interview and other assessment elements with your letter of invitation. The data we collect throughout the selection process will be held and used in accordance with the terms of the Data Protection Act.

Interview Expenses

Travel and subsistence expenses incurred during the selection process are the responsibility of the applicant.

Diversity Monitoring Form

Information given on the diversity monitoring form will be treated in strictest confidence and will be retained by HR for monitoring purposes. It will be kept separately from your application form and will not be made available to those involved in the selection decision. Disability

We are participants in the Jobcentre Plus “Positive about Disabled People” scheme. Under the terms of the scheme, all candidates who consider themselves to be disabled in terms of the Equality Act 2010, and who meet the essential minimum criteria for the post, will be guaranteed an interview. Note: The Equality Act 2010 states that a person has a disability if they have a physical or mental impairment and the impairment has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities. A 'substantial disadvantage' is a disadvantage which is more than minor or trivial. 'Long-term' means that the effect of the impairment has lasted or is likely to last for at least twelve months (there are special rules covering recurring conditions). We will also ensure that we consider and implement any reasonable adjustments you may require to attend for interview or during the course of your employment, should you be successful in securing a post.

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Starting Salary

We expect that all new entrants will join us on the minimum of the advertised pay range.

Working Pattern

The standard working week is a 5 day week of 37 hours, net of lunch breaks. You may have the scope to participate in the Scottish Government's flexible working scheme. Consideration will be given to candidates interested in part-time or other non-standard working patterns and in-line with best practice, the Scottish Government has extended to all staff the right to request a flexible working pattern. All requests will be seriously considered.

Annual Leave (pro rata for part-time)

You will have an annual leave allowance of 5 weeks, rising to 6 weeks after 4 years. In addition, the Scottish Government observes 11½ days public and privilege holidays, dates of which are set annually.

Probation

You will be required to serve a probationary period of 9 months and confirmation of your appointment is dependent on the satisfactory completion of this probation period in terms of performance, conduct and attendance.

Travel and Subsistence

Subsistence allowances and travelling expenses on official duty are paid. The cost of normal daily travel between home and office is not reimbursable.

Sick Absence

You are expected to attend for work. However, we do recognise that 100% attendance may not be possible on occasions when you are unwell. We have an attendance management policy in place that makes it clear the level of attendance that the Scottish Government expects and what may happen if this cannot be achieved. The policy outlines the support offered to staff during periods of illness and the assistance available to help them back to work.

Retirement

The Scottish Government has a "no retirement age" policy for staff in Bands A-C. This means that you are free to continue in employment for as long as you wish. Continued employment will remain subject to the normal rules concerning performance, conduct and attendance.

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Outside Activities

As a civil servant, you may not take part in any activity which would in any way impair your usefulness to the Service, or engage in any occupation which may conflict with the interests of the Scottish Government or be inconsistent with your official position. Subject to these conditions, and in some circumstances prior permission being sought, work of a minor or short-term nature (for example, vacation work or work after hours) is normally allowed. Also for health and safety purposes you should notify HR if you have more than one job. You will also be subject to certain restrictions, depending on your grade and the nature of your work, on national and local political activities. These include standing as a candidate in parliamentary or local authority elections, or canvassing on behalf of candidates; and expressing views on matters of political controversy in public speeches or publications.

The Civil Service Commission

The Department's recruitment processes are underpinned by the principle of selection for appointment on merit on the basis of fair and open competition.
